For the past 35 years, HOPE's innovative programming has served over 65,000 members of our community and touched the lives of several thousand more through our advocacy efforts. HOPE programs and educational events are open to all individuals who support Latina leadership to strengthen our democracy and advance economic mobility.

About the HOPE Regional Leadership Institute

Building on the success of our statewide and national leadership development programs, our Regional Leadership Institute will create multi-generational leadership pipelines and ongoing local centers for advocacy, while strengthening the local HOPE network to increase the number of Latinas represented in government, nonprofit leadership, and business. Focused on Los Angeles, the Inland Empire, the Bay Area, Central Valley, San Diego, and Imperial Counties, regional leaders will work to improve education, healthcare, and economic development for underserved communities in these regions.

Objectives of the HOPE Regional Leadership Institute



Build A Power Base

To build a connected and empowered base of regional leaders prepared to advocate effectively for equity and systemic change.



Placement on Boards and Commissions

Support the preparation and recruitment of equity-minded individuals to serve on local boards and commissions.



Equipping Emerging Leaders with Knowledge

To equip emerging community leaders with a deep understanding of local government structures, policy-making processes, and systemic inequities in order to strengthen their capacity for informed civic engagement.



Contribute to A Power-Building Ecosystem

HOPE partners with local base-building organizations and experts to partake in an exchange of technical trainings, and knowledge.

Institute Overview

The HOPE Regional Leadership Institutes (RLI) will train over 300 aspiring leaders in three years (2024-2027) to fill key local leadership roles and head initiatives that will create positive community impact in the program's focus regions. RLI is designed for local leaders who want to build their skills and network to influence public policy. The ideal applicant will be a civically engaged resident of one of the designated regions and demonstrate a record of readiness for an increasing leadership role in their respective community.

Institute sessions will deep dive into the mechanics of how local school boards, cities, counties and special districts (air, water, energy) work and the internal and external influences that determine outcomes. Participants will learn how to identify structural causes of inequity in public institutions and acquire the knowledge and skills to remedy inequities to improve the status of underrepresented individuals and all communities. Each session will include the opportunity for community building and access to immediate opportunities for local advocacy.

Session Components

- How to examine and use **data** to inform public policy.
- How **public policy** and **public budgets** are made.
- Understanding the flow of **power and influence** in policymaking.
- **Experiential** learning and case studies.
- **Immediate opportunities** for local advocacy and appointments.
- **Networking** and community building.
- Debrief and **evaluation**.

Ongoing Involvement through the Regional Hubs

HOPE Regional Hubs will launch in Fall 2025, bringing together alumnae from all HOPE programs who live in each designated region. The goal of the Hubs is to strengthen the local HOPE network and increase Latina representation in government, nonprofit leadership, and business. Each Regional Hub will provide a space for HOPE alumnae to connect regularly, coordinate local advocacy in education, healthcare, and economic development, and work together to remove barriers facing our communities.

HOPE will host quarterly Hub meetings to identify shared priorities, set goals, develop action plans, and foster collaboration and communication among participants. Over time, these Regional Hubs will grow into strong, organized networks of leaders who serve as a powerful force for local advocacy and representation.
